

Membership Engagement – Engaged Members Guide for Clubs

PURPOSE

The Engaged Members Guide is designed to help Optimist Clubs create a welcoming and rewarding environment where all currently engaged members feel valued, recognized, and connected. By fostering engagement, clubs can strengthen member retention, increase participation, and build a vibrant, thriving community.

OBJECTIVES

By following this guide, Optimist Clubs can foster a culture of appreciation and recognition, provide meaningful and fun opportunities for involvement, enhance communication and personal connections, and encourage long-term commitment through engagement.

1. Celebrate and Recognize Members

Recognizing and celebrating members' contributions is essential for fostering a positive and engaged club culture. Regularly acknowledging those who actively contribute through personal thank-you notes, verbal praise, or small, personal tokens of appreciation help members feel valued. Sharing their efforts on social media or in newsletters further highlights their dedication. Certificates and awards recognizing milestones like years of service, leadership roles, or special accomplishments should be presented either publicly or privately, depending on the individual's preference.

If your Optimist club conducts a yearly C.A.R.E. (Celebrate, Address, Recognize, Excel)
Program, part of the program is to show appreciation. Once the nitty-gritty has been dealt with, it's time to get back to celebrating. Step three of the program is to show appreciation, and what better way to bring smiles back to the faces of the attendees than with a few well-deserved awards. The President, or possibly the Board of Directors, will have chosen a few members to honor, and the facilitator will hand over the presentation to them.

Optimist International also offers the President's Citation to recognize outstanding member achievement. Only the current-year Club President may make the application, and it must be received in the International Office no later than August 31. Only one recipient per club will be accepted, and the citation will be shipped to the President for presentation to the member.

To make recognition even more personal, consider giving something that shows you put thought into it. For example, if a member is a huge coffee drinker, a new travel mug or a gift card to their favorite coffee shop could be a meaningful gift.

Keeping accurate records of member involvement through digital tracking tools or spreadsheets allows for consistent and fair recognition. Whether through thank-you notes, private acknowledgments, or other meaningful gestures, ensuring each member's contributions are recognized in a way that feels personal and respectful will help maintain a positive and engaged club culture.

2. Enhance Meeting Experiences

Make meetings enjoyable and engaging by incorporating fun activities and fostering a welcoming environment. Include interactive icebreakers and themed events to keep the atmosphere lively and fresh. Organize occasional games, such as Bingo or scavenger hunts, and offer small prizes to boost participation and involvement. Invite guest speakers—whether in person, virtual, or hybrid—to provide inspiration and new perspectives. Consider featuring local leaders, motivational speakers, or industry experts to keep meetings informative.

Assign meeting greeters to welcome attendees and create a warm, friendly environment, rotating this role to encourage interaction among members. Promote inclusivity by establishing a "Rule of Inclusion," ensuring meetings remain non-political and non-religious. Remember, as Optimist members, we need to follow the Optimist Creed at all meetings, even if we've had a bad day or are dealing with other challenges. By upholding the Creed, we help ensure that the environment remains positive and uplifting for everyone involved.

And keep in mind, having fun at meetings isn't about wearing a tropical shirt while going over the club bylaws—it's about creating an atmosphere that keeps everyone engaged, energized, and excited to participate and be there.

3. Strengthen Personal Connections

Foster strong connections within the club by encouraging informal one-on-one meet-ups, such as coffee dates or walks, to build relationships. Personal phone calls, texts, or

whatever method the member prefers to communicate with are another meaningful way to stay connected—assign someone to check in on members, especially if they start to miss meetings. Show support and celebrate milestones by sending "Sunshine Cards" for birthdays, achievements, or during challenging times, keeping a supply on hand for easy distribution. Highlight member birthdays and personal accomplishments in the club's newsletter, and consider hosting monthly or quarterly birthday celebrations during meetings to recognize and appreciate every member or announce them.

4. Encourage Active Involvement

Engage members by giving them meaningful roles or tasks that match their skills and interests, fostering a sense of ownership and satisfaction. When we add a new member, we typically have them fill out a member interest finder or meet with them to form a personal connection and learn about their interests. From there, we tailor involvement opportunities. It's also a good idea to check in periodically with members to see if their interests have changed, helping to keep them engaged.

Encourage volunteerism by providing clear sign-up sheets for events and committees. Share a regularly updated list of club activities, allowing members to choose opportunities that align with their interests, and distribute it through multiple channels to reach everyone. Strengthen friendships and build camaraderie by organizing social events outside regular meetings, such as potlucks, game nights, or community service days, offering members a relaxed and fun way to connect.

5. Communication & Information Sharing

Ensure members have the resources they need to succeed by providing clear and concise instructions through club notebooks, handouts, or digital resources. Keep the club's social media pages updated regularly to highlight member contributions and promote upcoming events, assigning a social media coordinator to maintain consistent engagement. To accommodate members who cannot attend in person, offer virtual or hybrid meeting options, ensuring the technology is user-friendly and accessible to all members, making participation easy and inclusive for everyone.

6. Member Feedback through the C.A.R.E. Program

To ensure ongoing engagement and address any concerns, clubs can implement the C.A.R.E. Program as a yearly "check-in" to keep membership healthy and active.

The C.A.R.E. Program stands for:

- C Celebrate: Acknowledge and celebrate the contributions and successes of members.
- A Address: Identify and address any concerns that members may have, ensuring they feel heard.
- R Recognize: Provide recognition for individual and collective achievements.
- E Excel: Foster growth and excellence by continually evolving the club to meet members' needs.

The C.A.R.E. Program helps strengthen clubs by ensuring members feel valued and heard

while addressing any issues and driving positive change. This encourages member retention and supports the club's future.

By implementing these strategies, Optimist Clubs can create a supportive, engaging environment where all members feel valued and connected.
