

VOTE ONLINE

For the next Optimist International At-Large Board Directors

Your Optimist Club will once again have the ability to participate in the election of Optimist International At-Large Board Directors by casting its vote online. Voting begins on May 1 and ends May 30. But to be eligible to vote your Club must have a valid e-mail address for your Club President on file with Optimist International. And your Club will need to have all of its financial obligations paid by April 30.

Dates to Remember

April 30 – Club voting strength is determined per International Bylaws and an e-mail is sent to every Club President outlining online voting procedure.

May 1 – Online election voting will open for 30 days.

May 31 – Results of elections posted on the Optimist website (pending audited review of ballots).

Make sure your Club President's email address is correct in the Optimist membership database to ensure that your Club receives the voting procedures. The Club President or Secretary should:

- Go to www.optimistleaders.org.
- Login with your credentials.
- If you do not know your credentials, click on the "Password Recovery" link.
- Click on your name and confirm e-mail is correct or enter correct address.

My Optimist EXPERIENCE

Last spring, I had the opportunity to compete in the Southern Wisconsin District Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. This contest was between myself and about seven other students. We were asked to answer the question "How the World Benefits from Optimism." Each person answered the question very differently, but not in the way that you would think. Sure, the answers themselves were different, but also the way they were presented were different. Some students signed their answer and had an interpreter speaking for them. Others spoke their answer while an interpreter signed for them. The Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing is very unique in that it bridges a gap between deaf and hard of hearing people that not many people know exists. It allows each individual to communicate how they really want to, and yet everyone in the room can still understand and participate.

Last year was not the first time I was able to compete in the contest. My sophomore year of high school I participated as well and it certainly made a difference. What I learned from these competitions was how to interact with other people from different places and different situations. This contest even played a role in my life as a Junior Optimist Member. I was given the confidence to run for International Board of Directors largely in part from this competition. The barriers I may have previously had were definitely broken down some by the Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. The contest encourages you to get out of your shell and meet new people, speak in front of a panel of judges and an audience, and to interact differently with people through sign and speech.

My Junior Optimist experience was a great one. For seven years, I was able to serve, learn, meet new people, and travel to conventions with my Club mates. I held several leadership positions locally and in my District. During my senior year of high school, I was also able to start attending my adult Club meetings. I would say that my Junior Optimist experience and the Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing both helped each other. I was definitely more comfortable meeting new people at the Communication Contests for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing because of my exposure to other people

at Junior Optimist conventions. In Junior Optimist, I would not have been able to get up in front of large audiences and speak if I did not participate in the Communication Contests for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. Now as a freshman in college, I can't say enough good things about how these two opportunities have shaped my life. Junior Optimist has given me forever friends across the country. Even more important than friends, Junior Optimist helped me find a passion in service and travel. The passion is so great that my intended degree is in International Studies.

Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing has increased my communication skills immensely and allowed me to be more comfortable with audiences and people in general. These two experiences are key parts of my growth in the latter part of my childhood. I would recommend both to anyone who has the chance to participate.

QUÉBEC CENTER DISTRICT'S OPTIMIST WORK CAMP DAY

Located in the heart of the Lanaudière region on a 40-acre peninsula on the edge of Lake Pierre is a vacation camp for young children with disabilities: Camp Papillon.

Since 1938, Camp Papillon annually welcomes nearly 1,000 young campers living with a disability for summer or winter stays. The Camp Papillon team makes sure these young people, who come from throughout Québec, have the chance to participate in outdoor life in an adapted and safe vacation camp.

Beginning in 1997, the Québec Centre District holds an annual Optimist work camp day to renovate the cabins and perform maintenance at the site.

During the last 20 years, the Québec Centre District and all of its Optimist Clubs, has amassed tens of thousands of dollars for the Camp Papillon Optimist work camp activity. Over time and with the support of numerous volunteers, we have succeeded in renovating 16 cabins that house the youth. Coming into Camp Papillon, you can see all the renovated cabins lined up along Optimist Avenue.

For Québec Centre District, Camp Papillon has meant thousands of volunteer hours spent on renovating and constructing cabins. Each year the following takes places: reconstructing stairs, balconies, roofs, fences, ramps, etc., removing mountains of leaves and branches along the 40-acre site, applying liters of paint to all the buildings, maintenance of welded pipes and electrical wiring, washing and cleaning cabins, and various other tasks.



THE "JOI" IN GIVING

The Rolla Mission aims to be a refuge for area citizens in need, by providing meals, showers, a free laundromat, a safe place to lounge, and even an area to sleep during cold winter nights. The non-profit organization helps citizens in the local area overcome obstacles and create better lives for themselves. When Rolla High School's Junior Optimist International Club (JOI, which is also referred to as Octagon Club), became aware of the Mission's goal, they decided to look deeper into the organization to see what they could do to help. Members' curiosity turned into a passion for volunteerism and led to a large project that benefited the children of their community in an imaginative way.

When a touring group of Octagon Club Members walked into The Mission's "Children's Room" in September of 2017, it was obvious what their next project would be. A small room with dark, peeling paint and broken toys was no place for a child to dream in, so the Club knew it was time for a revamp. At the following meetings, Members designed a room complete with bright paint and new furniture, and devised a budget to present to the parent Optimist Club of Rolla for financial assistance.

By December, the Club was given the go-ahead and began the process of ordering supplies. Latex paint for the walls, epoxy paint for the floors, and rocking chairs were donated upon request by a local business,



as well as books from the public library, making the task even more achievable for the small, student-led group. The physical renovation took place the third week of January, a snowy one for Missouri. A few dedicated Members and their Club advisor braved the weather, working for three days to clean, paint, and decorate the room, and assemble furniture. Filled with hot air balloons and posters from the Disney movie, *Up*, the room was themed with an inspiring message in mind, "Adventure is out there!", reminding children to not give up on their aspirations and that things can only go "up" from where they have been.

With support from The Mission's staff and cooperation from the citizens residing there, the Club's goal was achieved without struggle.

The Mission's director, Ashley Brooks, explained to Members the initial reactions of children who entered the room: "The kids, whenever they would walk in the room, I wish you could have heard the excited squeals coming out, because you did that for them, it was like their own gift. While their moms are doing laundry, it's a gift to them as well, for their kids to have their own playroom and have all of these great toys for them to play with that are educational, and that the moms can have the time to relax. Many of those kids may not have toys at home, or if they do they might be broken or old. But just the fact that you gave them that gift, it's incredible."

Not only was the community rewarded with the project, but the participants themselves, as they soon came to realize.

"What I aimed to accomplish by doing this project was doing something that would benefit a bunch of other people, not just me. So many people come in and out of The Mission and they have been through a lot. It's important that when they come to the shelter they feel there is a safe, clean spot for their kids to go, where they won't have to worry," senior Octagon Member Elizabeth Kemp said.

Kemp began the project with the selfless objective of helping others, and along the way benefited as well.

"Volunteering gives you the opportunity to help in someone's life and it helps you learn to be more appreciative in your own life," Kemp said.

Senior Member Jessica Qiu took on a leadership role in the project.

"In general, I think community service makes you a better person. You gain insight on your local community and become more empathetic and aware. You also become more appreciative for the things you have while knowing your hard work is going towards a good cause," Qiu said.

Members found that the work they put into the project was worth it, and that service learning and participating in projects much bigger than themselves brought them joy and understanding.

"By being a part of this project, I have learned many things not only about my community but of myself and my peers. It took much coordination and hard work to accomplish this task and it was a very rewarding experience. I met new people and became aware of issues in my local community that I wouldn't have been conscious of had I not participated in this project," Octagon Club Treasurer Diya Allada said.

Mrs. Brooks, The Mission's director, left the Club with an uplifting message after the project was finished.

"That's what I think is so amazing about your group, is that you are starting volunteering when you're in high school, and you're already building the foundation of who you are. So, when you go out in the world, you have this foundation to grow from and go up from there to do even greater things, because you were empowered when you were young to know that you can change the world. It's just amazing. I think you all are incredible. I really do."



The Octagon Club Members will continue to visit The Rolla Mission to clean the room, help prepare meals, etc. as the year progresses, and are still collecting toys to donate. They are eager to begin their next project, but in the meantime will continue to live as the Optimist Creed states, "By looking at the sunny side of everything and making their optimism come true."

OPTIMISTS GATHER IN NEPAL

The first Optimist conference held outside North America and the Caribbean convened in February. Five Optimist Clubs in Nepal gathered in the capital of Kathmandu for a day of training, fellowship and strategic planning designed to take the Optimist movement to the next level in the country.

"Five Members from each of the Clubs were invited to the conference," said Uday Niraula, the President of the Optimist Club of Kathmandu. "We also held an official business session at which policies and programs were developed for Optimist Nepal and an election was held for the Executive Committee."

Optimist Club of Kathmandu acted as host for the conference. Seminars included Better Understanding Optimist International and Optimist Nepal, Let's be Optimistic, and Kids Psychology and Parents-Kids Relationships. The group also developed a slogan to embrace for the remainder of this year: "Let's Expand and Build Incredible Relations."

"It's absolutely gratifying to have you and your clubs come together," said Optimist International President Nick Prillaman, who addressed a gathering of the Club presidents in a video conference call. "We're thrilled about your commitment to embrace the challenge of serving children in your country. I commend you and thank you for being a part of our organization."

No less than a dozen policy decisions were produced at the conference. Optimist Clubs in Nepal plan to conduct a Communications Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (CCDHH) in conjunction with the timing established by Optimist International.



The Members of Optimist Nepal will coordinate a national contest. The Clubs also agreed to conduct a campaign for organ donations for needy children.

Members at the conference have already embraced the idea of growing their Clubs and the organization in Nepal. They want to make the Optimist presence in their country large enough to form a District and the Club representatives pledged to work together to expand the Optimist presence into neighboring countries of the Asia-Pacific Region. Niraula reported that as part of that effort, two guests at the conference were from cities just across the border of Nepal in India.

Those attending the gathering agreed to meet again this fall in the city of Pokhara, where the local Optimist Club will act as host. In the meantime, several members are finalizing plans to seek the proper travel documents to attend the 100th Optimist International Convention in Ottawa, July 8-10.

OPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL LAUNCHES FIRST CLUB IN CHINA

An organizational meeting was held March 31 for the Optimist Club of Beijing representing the first Optimist Club in the People's Republic. The 19 Members of the new Club initially plan to work on a mobile library project that will help bring reading materials to children in remote areas.

A huge congratulations to Charter President Markus Masseli for his efforts. He initially reached out to Optimist International in January 2017. He helped guide the project to its successful conclusion. And an equally big thank you needs to go out to the June He Law Firm of Beijing and attorney Janet Hui, who provided pro bono legal assistance during the development phase of the project and will continue to do so during the government registration process. She is one of the charter Members.

The Club is a diverse group of individuals from various backgrounds and include not only Chinese Nationals, but also Members from several countries. The Club membership began growing instantly and reached 25 people within the first 48 hours of its existence. 


Project Ends with a Rousing Welcome to Scott Elementary!

Therefore, the Cap-Saint-Ignace's children have acquired a number of skills. They have learned how to sow crops, how to harvest vegetables, how to take care of their environment and how to communicate to sell their crops. In addition, what about the Optimist Club? They have networked and promoted their Club with the daycare staff and the parents, and they could build bridges with the

agribusiness, an important business in that area of the Lower St. Lawrence region.

"This is the kind of activity our Club is interested in," said Alain Brebion. "Besides the Optimist garden, we also have a soap-box race. We are in direct contact with the community and I think it is good for our Club."


